“There are times when the needs of a patron goes beyond our immediate services or an individual's comfort zone. You can probably think of a recent example right now. Knowing where to refer a customer or who to call in our communities can really help. When library staff reach out and connect with other community social service groups, we are adding new resources to our personal, staff, and community collections. Building personal relationships with agencies and individuals is an important step to nurturing our community resources. When we know just the right person or agency, we are offering a new source of information. Even handing a phone over to someone ready and able to help can mean the difference between barely surviving and thriving.”

New research report from LGBT Youth Scotland, the headline finding of which was:

“Women, bisexual people and transgender people were particularly likely to identify negative perceptions or experiences, as were those from rural areas.” [p5]

The report recommends:

- “Policies should be in place across all community, youth, and children's services to ensure that LGBT young people are not disadvantaged, discriminated against or excluded as a result of their sexual orientation or gender identity.

- Programmes should be rolled out within voluntary and statutory community organisations such as youth groups, to ensure that all staff are aware of LGBT identities and fully trained in responding to and, where possible, preventing homophobic, biphobic and transphobic discrimination.
- Voluntary and statutory services should take actions to ensure that LGBT young people feel valued and included in their local community.
- LGBT identities should be visible and embedded in promotional materials and informational resources.
- Monitoring, evaluation and planning should include considerations of the needs and experiences of LGBT people.” [p5]
