The Macpherson Report: twenty-two years on

"We have found that policing today is very different from twenty-two years ago. Since the Macpherson report was published there have been important improvements in policing including significant improvements in the policing of racist crimes, in the commitments made to promoting equality and diversity and in good examples of local community policing. But our inquiry has also identified persistent, deep rooted and unjustified racial disparities in key areas including a confidence gap for BME communities, lack of progress on BME recruitment, problems in misconduct proceedings and unjustified racial disparities in stop and search. In those areas, we propose urgent action." [p5]

Interesting article which places attempts to grapple with climate change in the context of power and wealth:

"We live in a world marked by severe disparities of wealth and power within and between countries, many of which are rooted in longer histories of colonialism and exploitation. These disparities have often allowed powerful companies in sectors like finance and energy to dictate the course of climate action. This has made it very difficult to pursue measures that might threaten their interests, but which would dramatically reduce emissions – like banning fossil fuel exploration."

Everyone In: where are they now? The need for a roadmap out of street homelessness in England

New report from Shelter, which reassesses the "Everyone In" initiative. According to their research:

- "7. [...] fewer than 1 in 4 (23%) people had moved into settled accommodation of at least six months that's an estimated 8,600 people.
- 8. This means that more than three-quarters (77%) of those initially accommodated under 'Everyone In' had not moved into settled accommodation. This equates to an estimated 29,000 people." [p4]

The report sets out a 'roadmap' to end rough sleeping: Protect (emergency accommodation); Prevent (financial assistance); Build (permanent new homes); Support (people to move into and sustain their homes); Involve (people with lived experience in co-producing solutions).

Positive news coverage in local media:

"A Hull hospital has become the first in the country to support patient care by bringing poetry, stories and chat to the bedside.

In a partnership which has its roots in the UK City of Culture programme, Library Link has completed a pilot scheme with volunteers from Hull and East Yorkshire reading poems and short stories to patients in wards and waiting rooms at Hull Royal Infirmary and is now gearing up to return post-Covid.

Research by Hull Libraries indicates the project has proved a hit with patients, staff and visitors after reaching more than 3,000 people. It has also made a difference with the readers – one man admitting his involvement had enabled him to overcome his dislike of hospitals – and organisers are now looking for more volunteers."

Ageing in coastal and rural communities

"This report explores the causes of health inequalities for older men, older people from ethnic minorities, and older lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans and queer+ (LGBTQ+) people in coastal and rural communities." [p4]

As well as making specific recommendations for each group, the report also makes some broad recommendations:

The five issues which need action across all groups are:

1. Loneliness and social isolation: particularly for some groups of older men, including older carers and men who are insecurely housed; and for both older LGBTQ+ people and older people from ethnic minorities, who often struggle to identify peers in their local areas

- 2. The digital divide: the rapid digitalisation of services is a potential driver of inequalities
- 3. A lack of support networks among people who move to rural and coastal communities: people may need additional support to identify appropriate services and to build social networks in new communities
- 4. Gaps in public transport provision: public transport provision can be patchy, and does not always take people to the places they want to go, as a result people rely heavily on their cars in rural (and to a lesser extent coastal) communities
- 5. Gaps in support for carers and people with dementia: there are gaps in the provision of appropriate and accessible support to meet people's specific needs" [p6]
