The main takeaways from the Conference, including:

- "Funding has had real impact on communities through green initiatives
 - download the Green Libraries Case studies
- Libraries are in a unique position between local authorities and the communities they serve
 - This means they can reach a wide audience
 - And run pilot green schemes at scale, as well as laying down data-baselines for wider reaching green initiatives
- Action doesn't need to be big making small changes to library infrastructure like repurposing furniture is a great start, and doesn't cost much
- Green libraries initiatives that incorporated nature helped build relationships with staff and communities
- Engagement is circular and you have to start somewhere, it doesn't matter if something fails the first time it still has an impact – even if it means starting again
- Data should underpin every activity when it comes to greening your buildings, and its easy to get started, all you need to do is measure your energy usage by dividing KW/h energy use by total floor area of the building"

"Food banks in the Trussell Trust network saw the highest ever levels of need, even more than during the peak of the pandemic, as more people found their incomes did not cover the cost of essentials like heating and food. Between April 2022 and March 2023, the number of people that used a food bank for the first time was 760,000.

December 2022 was the busiest month on record for food banks in the Trussell Trust network, with a food parcel being distributed every 8 seconds."

New report which is receiving some media attention.

"The UK is getting poorer and sicker. The UK faces a challenging economic outlook. While the March budget had some improved economic news, the UK economy is still projected to shrink in 2023, inflation remains high and the fall in household spending power in the next two years is predicted to be the highest in 70 years [...] At the same time, population health is going backwards. After rapid progress on life expectancy in the 20th century, the UK has rising rates of death and impairment – including higher prevalence of long-term conditions and greater rates of multimorbidity [...]

Good health has its own value – but this paper tests its relationship with prosperity. Good health is vital to an enjoyable and meaningful life, free from avoidable pain, anxiety and, in the worst cases, premature death. But it is also a crucial determinant of our economic prospects, both at an individual and a national level. This has been poorly accounted for by policymakers. In that context, this paper sets out to quantify whether better health could provide an answer to some of our most deep-rooted economic challenges and what policies could help 'price in' its value across all decisionmaking [sic]. Having conducted a multi-year data analysis that follows individuals over time, this report concludes that poor health harms both individual and national prosperity." [p5]

This exchange sets out very clearly the issues around people getting to the UK to claim asylum:

Question: Lord Strasburger

"To ask His Majesty's Government what are the legal methods for refugees who are citizens of Somalia, Syria, Iran, Iraq, Eritrea, Afghanistan, South Sudan, Myanmar or the Democratic Republic of the Congo to apply for asylum in the UK when they are (1) living in the country of their citizenship, (2) living in a safe third country, or (3) living in an unsafe third country."

Answer: Lord Murray of Blidworth

"Whilst we sympathise with people in many difficult situations around the world, we are not bound to consider asylum claims from the very large numbers of people overseas who might like to come here. Asylum is for people in danger in their home country. Those who need international protection should claim asylum in the first safe country they reach – that is the fastest route to safety.

Between 2015 and December 2022, just under half a million people were offered safe and legal routes into the UK– including those from Hong Kong, Syria, Afghanistan, Ukraine as well as family members of refugees.

This includes over 28,200 refugees resettled through the government's refugee resettlement schemes. Our family reunion policy has also reunited many refugees with their family members; we have issued over

44,659 visas under our refugee family reunion Rules since 2015. The UK is one of the largest recipients of UNHCR referred refugees globally, second only to Sweden in Europe since 2015.

The UK continues to welcome refugees and people in need through existing resettlement schemes which include the UK Resettlement Scheme (UKRS), Community Sponsorship, the Mandate Resettlement Scheme and the Afghan Citizens Resettlement Scheme (ACRS)."

New report from the Jesuit Refugee Service:

"This report shines a light onto the experiences of people placed in the asylum camp at the disused Napier Barracks in Kent. The Barracks were repurposed as accommodation for people seeking asylum in September 2020, and have since been used to accommodate single men in the early stages of the asylum process. This kind of asylum accommodation – large-scale, institutional, in an out-of-town camp, and so accommodation in a quasi-detention setting – was new in the UK. The site rapidly became mired in problems, including a serious COVID-19 outbreak and a fire. In June 2021, the High Court ruled that Napier did not meet the minimum legal standards for asylum accommodation. The Home Office claims to have made many improvements since then." [p6]

Shocking stats:

"International students are almost twice as likely to experience homelessness as home students, with 21% of international students having experienced homelessness since starting their studies, compared to 12% of home students.

International students struggle to secure housing more than home students because many do not have a UK based guarantor, which is required by most landlords to secure a tenancy. They are also more often targeted by housing scams, in which fraudsters pose as landlords and demand they pay a deposit in advance. When the student arrives in the country, they find the property they believe they had secured does not exist."
