This is the second Youth Endowment Fund "Children, violence and vulnerability" report which "[...] includes survey responses from over 7,500 teenage children aged 13-17 in England and Wales about their experiences in the past 12-months."

The findings are frightening:

- "16% of teenage children had been a victim of violence in the last 12 months
- 47% of teens had been a victim or witness of violence in the last 12 months
- 68% of children that were victims said they'd experienced violence that led to physical injuries

- 60% of children saw real-world acts of violence on social media, increasing to over 85% of children most at risk of involvement with violence. 29% had seen content relating to weapons.
- 47% of children reported that violence and the fear of violence impacted their day-to-day lives
- 20% of children (1 in 5) said they'd skipped school due to feeling unsafe.
- Victimisation rates were 31% among those now using foodbanks
- 62% of children thought that drugs were a major factor and half thought gangs were – the two highest drivers."

A moving article with a grim conclusion:

"Looking back, section 28 was a result of a fight between the right and left of British politics. Now, as the left and right battle to win the next general election, schools, teachers and LGBTQ+ identities are again under the spotlight.

We still await promised government guidance for teachers on gender identity in schools. Once again, they are not being trusted to talk to young people about gender and sexuality.

It is with a heavy heart that I await the political debates that will start as soon as the general election date is set. Spare a thought for those of us listening who are LGBTQ+. We are real people and who we are and who we love should not be used for political point-scoring. Let us at least learn that lesson from section 28."

There is also a thoughtful article, **"20 years after Section 28, why repealing anti-LGBT law wasn't enough"**, which argues that the impact is still very much with us:

"The impacts were 'of course devastating', one queer elder told openDemocracy this week. Section 28, repealed in Scotland in 2000, helped legitimise 'really harmful views' about queer people. Two decades on, these views continue to inform UK health and education policy, he explained, impacting queer and trans people's safety in their communities, experiences at work and school, and access to healthcare."

Important new report from Amnesty International, which reassesses the Prevent strategy and argues that:

"The UK's Prevent strategy violates some of our most fundamental rights. Its stated purpose is to 'stop people becoming terrorists'. To do so it requires schools, hospitals, local councils, universities, and other institutions to refer to the police people who they think might be drawn to terrorism – even though those individuals have not committed any crimes.

A person referred to Prevent – and their relatives – can experience lifechanging impacts: a loss of trust in state institutions; stress, anxiety and other mental health consequences; unmanageable financial costs associated with challenging referrals; and worries over their privacy and data protection. Poor transparency surrounding Prevent and barriers to redress compound these effects.

Efforts by institutions and individuals to comply with Prevent are leading to violations of people's rights to freedom of expression, freedom of thought, conscience and religion, freedom of peaceful assembly, and critically, the right to equality and non-discrimination." [p3]
