Just in case you haven't seen this:

"The number of children living in poverty has increased by 200,000 to a record high of 4.5 million, government figures have revealed.

The figures show that after housing costs the proportion of the UK's 14.5m children who are living in low-income households has increased from 30% in the 12 months to the end of March 2023 to 31% over the same period in 2024.

This has seen the number of children living in poverty rise from 4.3m to 4.5m, the highest level since comparable data has been available."

Important new research report:

"This paper is part of a project called "The Challenge of Ethnic Wealth Inequalities: Building Understanding" funded by the British Academy which aims to build a better understanding of how different ethnic groups have been able to build wealth while others have not and how this may have changed over time." [p4]

It draws together evidence from "[...] Storytellers [who] were asked to draw from their personal perspectives and experience to provide their understanding about what wealth means, the barriers racialised communities face in building wealth and their suggestions of what can enable them to do so. [p4]

Examples include:

- Ensure wage equity which keeps in pace with the cost of living
- Improving access to financial education and literacy

- Address assumptions and ideology of wealth and wealth accumulation
- Intersectionality
- Develop programs and systems that support collective wealth-building.

New briefing from the Learning and Work Institute:

"Thirteen per cent of all 16–24-year-olds in the UK are not in education, employment or training (NEET). This equates to nearly one million young people who are not currently learning or earning. The long-term scarring impact of being NEET for a sustained period of time on young people, society, and the economy, is well known. It is therefore of particular concern that 48% of young people in the UK are still not in education, employment or training a year after they first become NEET, equating to more than 360,000 young people likely to experience the long-term impacts of being out of work or education. A young person's previous experience of employment matters; 58% of NEET young people in the UK have never had a paid job.

This briefing from Learning and Work Institute provides an overview of the scale of how many NEET young people there are in the UK, what the characteristics of NEET young people are, and the differences in opportunity between different areas of England."

Safe and secure routes: refugee visa-to-travel proposal

New paper from Care4Calais, which argues that:

"Research from the UNHCR, shows that 'the majority of men, women and children who cross the Channel in small boats are likely to be recognised as needing protection as a result of an asylum claim and allowed to remain in the UK.' We must act then to honour our

responsibilities towards people wanting to use their humanitarian right to claim asylum here.

Over the last decade different policies have been introduced under the banner of reducing these crossings. These so-called deterrents include the Illegal Migration Act, the Safety of Rwanda Act, and the proposed Border Security, Asylum and Immigration Bill – which includes increased policing of the border, and criminalisation of refugees.

None of these policies have worked [...]

Therefore, this paper's key proposals are:

- Analysis, trial and implementation of a Safe Routes Visa-to-Travel Scheme, to allow refugees to enter the UK safely and begin their asylum claim.
- Greater investment in the Home Office to ensure staff in the department have the time, space and resources to properly determine visa-to-travel requests; free from political pressure and interference.
- Immigration detention centre reform, so refugees are helped rather than punished; and to provide a working environment wherein staff can produce better outcomes and a supportive environment for refugees." [p4]

Interesting article from the thinktank ODI Europe:

"When we hear about immigration from politicians and media across Europe, the story is almost always negative. In some countries, this is old news. The UK tabloid press has printed thousands of anti-migrant articles over the last two decades [...]

At ODI Europe, my colleagues and I have been studying public attitudes and political narratives around migration across Europe for five years. Our analysis has found that, compared to 20 years ago, more Europeans (in many, but not all countries) feel immigration makes their country a better place to live.

Positive attitudes have particularly increased in Ireland, the UK, Norway, Spain, the Netherlands, Belgium and Switzerland. Similar positive trends emerge when the public is asked about the economic and cultural impacts of immigration."

Interesting article:

"With an estimated minimum of 2.6 to 3.2 million irregular migrants in Europe and fierce public debates about them, policymakers face the difficult question of how to ensure migrants' basic rights of protection from exploitation, destitution and ill health while also establishing effective migration controls. However, we know surprisingly little about how Europeans think about this policy dilemma.

In our study, the first of its kind in Europe, we surveyed 20,000 people across Austria, Italy, Poland, Sweden, and the UK to understand their preferences on policies regarding access to healthcare, social welfare and labour protections, as well as the obtainment of regular legal status or 'regularisation' for irregular migrants.

The results challenge the idea that public attitudes toward irregular migrants' rights are simply 'for' or 'against'. Instead, we find that variations in policy design matter – and when policies include both migration controls and protections for migrants, public support often increases."

But the claim is misleading. The government's latest figures show that only 6,339 of these were 'enforced returns'. The majority were 'voluntary returns' - and a significant number of these happen without the government's direct involvement or even knowledge."
